The Primary School



We Met Unprecedented Challenges

Throughout 2020, the American Friends of Neve Shalom/Wahat al-Salam provided critical support during incredibly challenging times. In March, the Village's Primary School—the first school in Israel where children learn together in Hebrew and Arabic—transitioned to distance learning in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The shutdown affected approximately 315 students, ages kindergarten through sixth grade, from more than a dozen communities throughout the region, many of whom were not equipped with the technology necessary to participate in virtual classrooms. And, as the pandemic raged, families whose jobs were affected found themselves no longer able to afford tuition.

American Friends immediately took up a call to action, instituting the Adopt-a-Scholar program to underwrite tuition for approximately 30 students, raising over \$35,000 towards the effort. Your donations also ensured that every Primary School student had the internet access and computer needed to join their classmates online. In a year of upheaval, your generosity brought much-needed security and continuity to these children's education, friendships, and routines.

AFNSWAS provided \$240,403 to the Primary School in 2019-20.

Since my first visit to the village in 1983, I have admired the founding families of NSWAS and their deep passion for creating peace. Their unswerving commitment to a life of co-existence and dialogue is a vital beacon of hope that inspires people around the globe.

The School for Peace

We Proved Dialogue Is Possible

The programs and initiatives developed at Oasis of Peace since the Village's founding in 1970 have consistently demonstrated that even those with the most deep-seated differences can learn to hear each other, understand each other, and live together joyfully. Over the past year, your generosity has been critical to sustaining a range of peace-building activities and dialogues, including artistic collaborations between Arab and Jewish teens, illuminating conversations between filmmakers and their audiences, and passionate debates



about environmental justice, healthcare, and human rights. Among the highlights:

The School for Peace celebrated its 30th year offering graduatelevel courses in conflict resolution to universities in Israel, including Tel Aviv University, Ben-Gurion University of the Negev, Haifa University and Ruppin College.

AFNSWAS provided \$100,000 to the SFP in 2019-20.

I believe our shared destiny will evolve in one of two ways: either we will remain together in this darkness of pain, or we will choose to reconcile and build a new shared reality that might help awaken all the people on this planet to our common humanity. This is what we have been doing as best we can at Oasis of Peace. 🌹

Humanitarian Aid Program

We Saved Lives

In 2020, COVID-19 worsened an already strained health care system in the Gaza Strip. By July, Gaza Hospital was facing a 50 percent shortage of medicines required for patients suffering from chronic illnesses, including kidney disease, diabetes, and cancer.

Your donations to Oasis of Peace's Humanitarian Aid Program, which provides needed medical services as well as in-kind donations for Palestinians living under occupation, sent thousands of dollars' worth of medicine directly to the hospital. They also facilitated the purchase a water generator for Gaza's second largest hospital. Due to the salinization of the coastal aquifer, producing fresh water in Gaza has become increasingly difficult, and this generator is crucial to the hospital's ability to care for patients—by converting air to water, it produces approximately

1,320 gallons of clean water per day.

As the pandemic continues to devastate vulnerable communities around the world, your generosity is easing the suffering of those in the Gaza Strip stricken with COVID-19, supplying basic equipment such as the Facial CPAP mask, which provides relief for patients prior to the stage at which a full ventilator is required. AFNSWAS provided \$10,000 to the Humanitarian Aid Program in 2019-20.



In the chaos of occupation, the Humanitarian Aid Committee continues to step up and deliver needed resources to those whose lives have been so terribly disrupted. American Friends of Neve Shalom/Wahat al-Salam helped make all of this work possible.

The Nadi - Youth Club



The Nadi Youth Center teamed up with the film school of Tel Aviv University to offer filmmaking classes to Arab and Jewish youth. The project resulted in a documentary film about Oasis of Peace residents that premiered in the Village and went on to screen in locations across Israel.

AFNSWAS provided \$15,000 to the Nadi in 2019-20.

The Pluralistic Spiritual Center's Cinema in the Community brought leading Jewish and Palestinian directors to the Village to talk about their films, which deal with social issues and relations between Arabs and Jews, Israelis and Palestinians.



AFNSWAS Financial Management: AFNSWAS a 501(c) (3) organization in good standing, fully compliant with provisions required under the Sarbanes-Oxley Act of 2002 and is independently audited, annually, by James Vanstrom & Company of Falconer, NY which has consistently reported satisfactory results. Internal controls are implemented through an internal Audit Committee. The Board of Directors exercises full discretion and control over all grants to Neve Shalom/Wahat al- Salam through a multi-stage process that begins when the Board and the AFNSWAS staff meet with NSWAS representatives. The Board decides, from a list of potential projects, what it should solicit funding for and then, after a careful consideration of the formal grant proposals submitted to AFNSWAS by NSWAS, determines which grants, and how much, will get funded. The Board, through on-site visits by individual directors and through extensive reporting by NSWAS, ensures that the funds have been used as intended.
