The community is expanding and a new neighborhood of members is being formed. NSWAS is grateful to all who have supported the ongoing and expanding programs of the School for Peace, the bilingual/multicultural Primary School, the Oasis Art Gallery and the Community Spiritual Center.

The American Friends of NSWAS has kept fundraising costs below ten percent for the past two years, receiving Guidestar's Gold Seal for the second year in a row. We have a one hundred percent Accountability and Transparency rating from Charity Navigator and have earned Global Giving's Leader Status for AFNSWAS's engagement and effectiveness over the past year. Our commitment to ongoing operations, governance and program evaluation has contributed to growing success.

One metric of success comes from supporter's response to our programs, both long-running and recently begun. It is to you and each supporter, whether individual or organization, to whom AFNSWAS is grateful. You make the actual work possible as your support encourages the Jewish/Palestinian peace-building, conflict-transforming work and sustains the changes on the ground.

Outreach and Education



Over the years, American Friends of Neve Shalom/Wahat al-Salam has developed materials and strategies that we share freely and (free of charge) with individuals, schools, congregations, and other community groups who reach out to us. A large part of this outreach has been the speaker tours in which people from Neve Shalom/Wahat al-Salam visit the US to meet with groups across the country, sharing their stories and their mission.

Our most recent speakers, Samah Salaime and Lihi Joffe, travelled across the US to educate listerners about the challenges facing Jewish and Palestinian citizens of Israel and the complexities of working across entrenched interests and political realities. They brought to life the programs of Neve Shalom/Wahat al-Salam focused on developing and strengthening Jewish/Palestinian bridge-building and conflict resolution. There were thoughtful, probing conversations at every stop as they connected with the people they met and responded to their audiences' questions about identity, history, community, and religion.

The AFNSWAS website is increasingly a source of connection, with donations increasing 7% in the past three years. Visitors to the site can also read up-to-date content about AFNSWAS and the community of NSWAS, or review past updates and educational materials.







The Primary School

The Primary School (PS) continues to be a trailblazer in bilingual and multicultural education This year, the PS published and distribute its formalized curriculum as a way of sharing its knowledge across the region. The curriculum is now available by request in Arabic and Hebrew with plans to translate it into English and make the curriculum available online.

At The Primary School, children learn to read, write and speak Hebrew and Arabic in all areas of life, from academic to social. English is introduced as the third language at The Primary School. As the school grows in numbers, it works to maintain Jewish/Palestinian and gender balance in the student body, building the NSWAS vision of an equal, shared and peaceful future for all students and families.

AFNSWAS provided \$212,900 to the Primary School in 2018-19.

The School for Peace



A highly effective set of curricula and an innovative approach to learning has garnered the School for Peace (SFP) an international reputation for excellence. 2019 marks the school's 40th anniversary of providing change-making and peace-building courses to Israeli Palestinian and Jewish professionals in a variety of fields, from journalists and city planners, to lawyers, educators and health care professionals. Over the years the SFP has expanded their curricula to partner with high schools, colleges and universities, creating youth programming and year-long courses in cooperation with Palestinian

AFNSWAS provided \$135,000 to the SFP in 2018-19. and Jewish educators. The SFP has also developed a series of regional and national conferences which bring further opportunities for like-minded professionals to develop connections, share knowledge, and inspire progress. This network of partners is now growing at an increasingly rapid rate as SFP alumni use the skills they have learned to make a positive impact and create space for a shared future in their many fields.

Humanitarian Aid Program

In areas of crisis in Gaza and the West Bank, the Humanitarian Aid Program (HAP) serves as a literal lifeline. Since 2002, NSWAS volunteers have provided Gaza hospitals and West Bank refugee camps and isolated villages with free medical care including examinations, medicines, surgery, and referrals where possible. HAP also provides aid to emergency responders, nurses, and doctors in the field.

Dr. Raid Haj Yehia, a pediatrician, has worked tirelessly for the past several years, with HAP and Physicians for Human Rights, to treat children in Gaza City's al-Shifa hospital. all of whom are without access to needed medical care. With the help of supporters from NSWAS and AFNSWAS HAP has transferred children with serious and life-threatening conditions to specialist hospitals in Israel, provided open clinics in villages and rural areas, and distributed medical supplies to those in need.

AFNSWAS provided \$10,000 to the Humanitarian Aid Program in 2018-19. Through the support of American and International donors and volunteers, HAP also provides a one-week camp held in the village, providing children from West Bank refugee camps with the opportunity to participate in the village's lived reality of equality and mutual respect. The HAP Summer Camp gives children and their families a vision of a shared and peaceful future— while in the West Bank, HAP medical volunteers make sure that those in need of medical attention get the chance to see that future unfold.



The Nadi - Youth Club



The Nadi, the village's youth club, brings youth of all ages together to learn, grow, and connect.

The Nadi has been expanding in numbers and activities under its new director Lihi Joffe, who has, with actress and lifelong village resident Yasmin Bar Shalom Agman, to create an compelling,

inclusive community theatre program for youth. This year saw much growth in participation in the Nadi— following the immense success of the theatre program's first season in 2018 and the increasing interest in both the Nadi and the

AFNSWAS provided \$5,000 to the Nadi in 2018/19. arts that followed, the Nadi is developing a more comprehensive arts and arts-education program for children and young adults.



Doumia-Sakinah/Pluralistic Spiritual Center, Peace Museum, and Oasis Art Gallery







In the 19 years since the Spiritual Center opened, it has provided space and leadership for learning, reflection and cooperation. The Center is available to everyone and is a place where people can come together to share a cross-cultural celebration and to form communities of interest. The Cinema in the Community program in particular was a breakout hit for the Center, bringing together first-time visitors and longtime supporters in a love of film and learning.

The Spiritual Center center has expanded in recent years to give birth to the Peace Museum and Oasis Art Gallery, providing a new opportunity to encounter and understand the conflict. In 2019, moving and ground-breaking exhibits engaged visitors in topics such as violence against women,




conflicting identities, youth, and family. Visitors from around the world were invited to experience and connect with the exhibitions and works both through viewings and through the many artist encounters and talks that were given over the year.

AFNSWAS provided \$11,000 to the Doumia-Sakinah/Pluralistic Spiritual Center, Peace Museum, and Oasis Art Gallery in 2018-19.






What did your contributions fund in 2017-2018?

AFNSWAS Financial Management: AFNSWAS a 501(c)(3) organization in good standing, fully compliant with provisions required under the Sarbanes-Oxley Act of 2002 and is independently audited, annually, by James Vanstrom & Company of Falconer, NY which has consistently reported satisfactory results. Internal controls are implemented through an internal Audit Committee. The Board of Directors exercises full discretion and control over all grants to Neve Shalom/Wahat al- Salam through a multi-stage process that begins when the Board and the AFNSWAS staff meet with NSWAS representatives. The Board decides, from a list of potential projects, what it should solicit funding for and then, after a careful consideration of the formal grant proposals submitted to AFNSWAS by NSWAS, determines which grants, and how much, will get funded. The Board, through on-site visits by individual directors and through extensive reporting by NSWAS, ensures that the funds have been used as intended.
